Cognitive-communication—how well our minds work. Problems may involve memory, attention, problem solving, organization, and other thinking skills. Feeding and swallowing—how well we suck, chew, and swallow food and liquid. A swallowing disorder may lead to poor nutrition, weight loss, and other health problems. This is also called dysphagia.

Speech-language therapists are specifically trained to diagnose and treat speech, language and swallowing disorders. If you have Parkinson's disease, a speech-language pathologist can help you: Maintain as many communication skills as possible. Teach you techniques to conserve energy, including using nonverbal communication skills.

Improved communication. Healthcare providers should always ask the patient or carer whether they have difficulty swallowing medication, and assess the reasons for this; Speech and language therapists should state, if it is relevant, in their assessment recommendations that the patient could have potential problems with swallowing their medication

Potential Complications of Swallowing Problems . The act of chewing changes the food into a softer and more slippery food bolus that is suitable and safe for swallowing. As the swallowing reflex advances through its different phases, the nerves involved in swallowing trigger the reflexive closing of the larynx and the epiglottis.

Management . Drooling of saliva, a challenging condition, is

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better managed with a multidisciplinary team approach. The team includes primary care physician, speech therapist, occupational therapist, dentist, orthodontist, otolaryngologist, paediatrician and neurologist. After initial assessment, a management plan can be made with the patient.
